In addition, some of our rangers are also finding out more information about the Red Siskin by monitoring their life cycle.

Environmental Education Curriculum

Term Two of the Environmental Education Curriculum has now begun! This term, students will be learning all about their landscape. This will include lessons on different types of ecosystem (such as bush islands and wetlands), geology, hydrology and how to look after our environment.

Students will again be taking part in scientific activities which will involve finding out knowledge such as "how did Shea Rock get there?". At the same time, they will also do practical activities including making volcanoes, litter picks, scavenger hunts and lots more!

Giant Anteater Research and Monitoring

Rangers in Katoonarib Village and Wichabai Ranch have been busy monitoring Giant Anteaters. They have set up a Giant Anteater board as well as a map in Katoonarib which villagers can add to every time they spot an Anteater.

The rangers have also been going out twice a week to see if they can discover how many Anteaters are in the area. They are able to do this as every Anteater has different features (e.g. the location of the stripe, the shape of the stripe) that allows rangers to tell them apart.

Finally, they have also set camera traps throughout the area to help estimate the number of Anteaters found around Katoonarib.

Interesting Wildlife Facts!

Rupununi Rattlesnake/Sakotakii/Patako (*Crotalus durissus trigonicus*) - There are over 29 species of rattlesnake in the world and all of them are venomous from birth!

Tiger Catfish/Koruzu/Kurutu (Pseudoplatystoma fasciatum) - Tiger catfish have long whiskers which help them hunt for food!

Note: The Endangered Red Siskin (Spinus cucullata) is officially protected by the South Rupununi Conservation Society.

The Giant Anteater (Myrmecophaga Tridactyla), one of the giants of the Rupununi, is also Endangered and is officially protected in Guyana.
